

Saint Francis of Assisi

Born at Assisi in Umbria in 1181

Dedicated his life to expressing God's "brotherhood" through his relationship with all of creation

Francis died on October 3, 1226

He was declared a saint in July, 1228

(A prayer for a faculty meeting in October)

Let us remember... All: that we are in the holy presence of God.

Reader One

Francis felt a disdain for lepers and avoided them at all costs. One day Francis was riding his horse in the countryside and he caught sight of a leper walking toward him. His instinct was to turn back or move off to the side to avoid contact with the poor wretch. But instead Francis rode directly toward this man who had parts of his face and hands eaten away by this dreaded disease.

Francis dismounted and warmly embraced and kissed the leper tenderly on his lips. In his Testament, Francis writes, "When I was in sin, the sight of lepers nauseated me beyond measure; but then God himself led me into their company. When I had once become acquainted with them, what had previously nauseated me became a source of physical consolation for me." Francis eventually came to realize that he had actually embraced none other than his Lord, Jesus Christ. (Franciscan Media: 7 Key Moments in the Life of St. Francis)

Reader Two

Recognize Jesus beneath the poor rags of the children whom you have to instruct. Adore him in them. Love poverty, and honor the poor, following the example of the Magi, for poverty ought to be dear to you, responsible as you are for the instruction of the poor. May faith lead you to do this with affection and zeal because these children are members of Jesus Christ. In this way this divine Savior will be

pleased with you and you will find him because he always loved the poor and poverty. (DLS Meditations for Principal Feasts 96.3)

ALL: O divine master grant that I may

not so much seek to be consoled as to console

to be understood as to understand

To be loved as to love

For it is in giving that we receive

it is in pardoning that we are pardoned

And it's in dying that we are born to eternal life
